### 8. People budget and approach 2023/24

The Board and Management discussed the pressures on pay – where we are often competing with the private sector for key talent. s 9(2)(b)(ii)

### 9. Health, safety & wellbeing update

The Board acknowledged the recent tragic death of a contractor on a roading site. s 9(2)(g)(i)

Amongst other things, the Board and Management discussed:

- The support in place for staff affected by recent weather event
- There have been a number of recent gun-related incidents with staff and contractors. The Board requested a deep dive on how the harmful interactions risk is being managed.

### 10. Review of current tolling arrangements

The Board and Management discussed the paper.

#### Resolutions

The Board:

 Approved increases in toll tariffs on the Northern Gateway, Tauranga Eastern Link and Takitimu Drive Toll Roads from 1 July 2023, as follows:

- Noted an option to announce a deferred start to the increases (e.g. to take effect from 1 July 2024) might be considered in light of recent weather events impacting the upper and eastern North Island.
- Noted the proposed changes are equivalent to 2% per annum since the previous increases in 2019, rounded to the nearest 10c increment – below actual CPI increases of nearer 4%.
- Noted the increase in administration costs from 70c to 80c.

### 11. Monthly financial update

The Chief Financial Officer provided an update on the financial position, noting that it is finely balanced. Revenue remains particularly uncertain with the headwinds of a potential recession.

There is good engagement with Treasury on the PPP claims, and we expect to be able to draw down on the contingency to cover costs to date. \$\frac{s}{2}(2)(b)(ii)\$

### 12. Board indemnity & Board committees

#### Resolutions

The Board:

- Authorised Waka Kotahi the New Zealand Transport Agency (Waka Kotahi) indemnifying Dr Paul Reynolds by entering into a deed of indemnity with him in materially the same form as those authorised at the December 2020 Board meeting (Deed of Indemnity).
- Authorised any other two Board members to execute the Deed of Indemnity on behalf of Waka Kotahi.

### 13. Investment & Delivery Committee report back

The Committee Chair provided an overview of the meeting, noting in particular the discussion in relation to SH35 and the updated resolutions.

#### Resolutions

The Board:

#### Enhanced FAR rates

- Noted Cabinet has allocated \$250m for emergency works response for local roads, KiwiRail, and state highways for the January flooding and Cyclone Gabrielle through to 30 June 2023.
- Noted the funding will help cover the initial emergency works
  response from these events at high funding assistance rates (FARs)
  against the background of an already constrained National Land
  Transport Fund, over-subscribed maintenance activity classes and
  Councils with restricted ability to pay.
- Approved a one-off special FAR for all approved organisations of normal FAR plus at least 40% (up to 100%) and allowing for further bespoke FAR adjustments based on financial hardship to a maximum 100%, applying only for emergency works for local roads funding requests in response to the January flooding and Cyclone Gabrielle for expenditure covered by the Crown appropriation of \$250m.

#### SH35 bridge outage

- Notes that as part of its due diligence the Committee enquired as to the controls around access to the temporary road and management of safety controls at the site, and was advised that:
  - access conditions would be set by Waka Kotahi at its discretion

- the conditions set would be designed to ensure the private road was safe for the types of vehicles using it
- An independent review would be conducted to confirm that the road is to the standard and construction standard stated by the contractor (Secondary Road to NZFOA road engineering guidelines)
- Notes Management is working with WorkSafe proactively to notify the
  public of the intention by the owners with limited funding support from
  Waka Kotahi to make the private road available for public use
  temporarily (subject to safety controls being in place).
- Notes the benefits of this approach include:
  - securing access for the community (until the bailey bridge is installed to open SH35)
  - enabling a diversion route to be used for heavy vehicles while a longer term solution is built, as heavy vehicles will not be able to use the bailey bridge on an unrestricted basis
  - having a diversion route established, for future resilience (e.g. if another weather event damages the bailey bridge).
- Notes that providing limited access using a temporary private road has been undertaken in the past (including with Nelson/Marlborough SH 6 rebuild post the 2022 weather event).
- Approves Waka Kotahi negotiating and agreeing with private land owners, and making payment from the NLTF, to secure access to a Hikuwai Diversion Route subject to:
  - An independent review being conducted to confirm that the road is to the standard stated by the contractor (Secondary Road to NZFOA road engineering guidelines)
  - A funding or other suitable agreement being in place
  - Waka Kotahi having access to the site at its discretion
  - Waka Kotahi ability to notify of withdrawal of public use, and
  - Waka Kotahi being satisfied that the route is safe to be used in line with operational controls that it would impose, such as convoyed traffic control.

#### Guidance on investment decision making and ERP

- Noted the guidance on investment decision-making in relation to the Emissions Reduction Plan.
- Noted we will publish the guidance ahead of possible receipt of a letter setting out the Minister's expectations.

#### Arataki release

 Approved release of the current iteration of Arataki on 17 March 2023 publicly for targeted external engagement to develop the next iteration.

#### Auckland cycling investment SSBCs

- Endorsed the M\u00e4ngere East Cycling Network SSBC valued at \$57.5m, (P95 = \$67.8m)
- Endorsed the Manukau Cycling Network SSBC valued at \$41.1m, (P95 = \$50.3m)
- Approved funding of \$16.6m (51% FAR; NLTF share \$8.5m) to Auckland Transport from the walking and cycling activity class for:
  - Cycling Investment M\u00e4ngere East with total shared project costs of \$9.2m (NLTF share \$4.7m) for pre-implementation
  - Cycling Investment Manukau with total shared project costs of \$6.1m (NLTF share \$3.1m) for pre-implementation
  - Cycling Investment Manukau with total shared project costs of \$1.3m (NLTF share \$0.7m) for Tranche 0 implementation.
- Noted that \$10.9m (\$4.3m NLTF share) of the funding requested falls in the 2024-27 NLTP period.

#### Tauriko West enabling works

- Approved the cost scope adjustment and increase in funding of \$14.65m for the Western Corridor Growth Management activity at a funding assistance rate of 51% (\$7.47m from the NLTF Local Road Improvements Activity Class).
- Noted this increases the approved shared total project cost from \$203.2m (P95) to \$217.85m (P95).
- Approved the settlement of the Judicial Review with Tauranga Crossing Limited and Tauranga City Council on the basis of the key terms set out in this paper.
- Delegated authority to the Chief Executive to approve and execute
  the settlement agreements necessary and desirable to give effect to
  the above approval with Tauranga Crossing Limited and Tauranga
  City Council.
- Noted that the settlement of the Judicial Review includes Tauranga Crossing Limited supporting the RMA approvals for the Enabling Works.

#### TS funding decisions report

#### Hamilton section of the Waikato Expressway

- Approved funding to Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency for the Hamilton Section Waikato Expressway for an increase of \$41m from the NLTF State Highway Improvements Activity Class for the Implementation phase, thereby increasing the approved total cost from \$815m to \$856m.
- Noted that the total cost of the project is in excess of the total funding approved by the Board in November 2021 of \$836.8m.
- Noted the revised expected total cost of \$856m is \$126m below the original estimate of \$982m approved in 2015.

 Noted that costs for the Implementation of the Cambridge Road upgrade works are part of the project scope but are deferred to the 2024-2027 NLTP period and are not forecasted.

#### Baypark to Bayfair Link

- Approved funding to Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency for Bayfair to Baypark Link for an increase of \$21.6m from the NLTF State Highway Improvements activity class, for Implementation phase, thereby increasing the approved total project cost from \$270.1m to \$291.7m.
- Noted that the total cost of the project is in excess of the total funding previously approved. The Board approved a price level adjustment that allowed for a confidential settlement agreement resolving claims with the Contractor to be executed in December 2020, increasing the total project cost from \$175.1m to \$270.1m

#### **Buller District Council Enhanced FAR**

 Approved an enhanced FAR of 95% (NLTF share an additional \$871,640) for the reinstatement of roads damaged, from the local road maintenance activity class

#### Christchurch Mass Rapid Transit IBC Variation

 Noted that the Chief Financial Officer has approved funding to Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency for PT Futures MRT for an increase of \$1.10m from the NLTF Public Transport Infrastructure activity class for the Indicative Business Case phase, thereby increasing the approved total phase cost from \$2.70m to \$3.80m

#### **Northern Corridor Improvements**

- Noted that the CFO has approved funding to Waka Kotahi NZ
   Transport Agency for Northern Corridor Improvements project for an increase of \$8m from the NLTF State Highway Improvements activity class, for the Implementation phase, transferred from the global PLA approved for Covid claims and escalation. Therefore, no additional funding allocation is required for the requested TOC increase.
- Approved the new Northern Corridor Improvement alliance TOC of \$709m, which results from the \$8M increase for escalation for the Jan 21 to Jun 22 period

#### Peka Peka to Ōtaki

- Noted that the GGM Transport Services has approved a drawdown on contingency to Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency for Peka Peka to Ōtaki to increase the professional services contract value by \$1.05m to \$20.55m. This is within the project budget of \$445m and will be covered by contingency, reducing the contingency to \$4.56m (included in the budget). These two variations are:
  - WSP's extension of time for the Principal Advisory (PA) services and MSQA works.
  - Extension of time for independent site representatives to deliver the 'Quality Right' initiative.

### 14. Risk & Assurance Committee report back

The Committee Chair provided an overview of the meeting.

The Board discussed and approved the proposed audit fee for FY23, noting that the OAG had achieved a reduction from the originally proposed fee. The Board requested that Management discuss with Treasury whether Waka Kotahi should continue to carry the cost of the audit of the SH valuation for FY24, and whether that part of the audit needs to be undertaken annually.
