Strategic resilience cases

- Notes that the Committee asked Management to undertake further work to identify how pre-works activity can be delivered more effectively.
- Notes that aspects of the BCR methodology are not necessarily suitable to all recovery works.
- Notes that the business case and strategic responses are being endorsed on the assumption that additional Crown funding for the works will be provided in the future.
- Endorsed the SH2 Waikare Gorge Realignment Single Stage Business Case.
- Endorsed the Hawke's Bay Strategic Resilience Response.
- Endorsed the Whangārei to Dome Valley Resilience Strategic Response.
- Endorsed the Coromandel-Hauraki Resilience Strategic Response.
- Noted that Waka Kotahi has submitted investment proposals to Te Manatū Waka Ministry of Transport and Te Tai Ōhanga Treasury for National Resilience Plan funding for business case and due diligence activities.

Draft Investment Prioritisation Method for 2024-27 NLTP

 Approved the release for consultation of the draft Investment Prioritisation Method for the 2024-27 National Land Transport Programme (NLTP).

NLTP development timeline and special purpose roads

- Endorsed delaying adoption of the NLTP from 30 June to 31 August 2024 in response to the delay in release of the draft Government Policy Statement (GPS).
- Approved South Wairarapa, Westland, Whakatane, Buller, and Wairoa SPRs to continue at 100% FAR for the 2024-27 NLTP.

 Approved Hurunui, Southland, Tasman, New Plymouth, Taupo, Stratford and Ruapehu SPRs to move to normal FAR for the 2024-27 NLTP.

NZUP GG update

- Approved the Rolleston Access Improvements Detailed Business
 Case (NZUP Canterbury Package) and for Waka Kotahi to proceed to
 the pre-implementation phase at an estimated cost of \$15.2 million
 (P50).

PPP annual RAMA reporting

 Authorised the Waka Kotahi Chief Executive under Board delegation to execute the Master RAMA Report(s) and Attachment 1 to the paper, Annual Compliance Certificate for each of the Transmission Gully and Pūhoi to Warkworth projects.

SH5 Napier to Taupo programme business case

- Endorsed the State Highway 5 (SH5) Napier to Taupō Programme Business Case.
- Noted the preferred programme is Programme 7, which focuses on corridor wide safety improvements at a total cost of \$629.7m.
- Noted that no funding is sought in this paper and that investment for the next phases will be sought through the approval process for the 2024-2027 National Land Transport Programme.

Mt Messenger update

Wellington rail Plan

- Endorsed the Wellington Rail Plan Programme Business Case, noting the Drive Mode Shift programme as the preferred option provided there is clear justification for any investment beyond the Moderate Improvements programme.
- Noted that endorsing the Wellington Rail Plan Programme Business Case does not commit Waka Kotahi to funding any future activities.
- Noted the 30-year capital cost of the preferred programme is \$7.3b
 (P50) to \$11.5b (P95) and the BCR is 1.1-1.5.
- Noted that significant Crown investment is needed to implement the 30-year recommended programme as it is unaffordable under the NLTF.
- Noted the first tranche of the programme will be submitted for prioritisation in the 2024-27 NLTP.

Auckland Transport emergency works

- Approved, subject to provision of further Crown appropriation and work being undertaken by Auckland Transport to identify network efficiency opportunities (including resilience), additional funding for this emergency work at a total cost of \$185,088,856 (NLTF share of \$134,625,981) for FY 2023-24. This is made up of:
 - An increase of \$22,205,456 (NLTF share \$20,206,965) at a funding assistance rate of normal FAR +40% (91%) towards immediate response from Local Roads Maintenance Activity Class.
 - An increase of \$162,883,400 (NLTF share \$114,419,016) made up of \$3,131,905 at a funding assistance rate of normal FAR (51%) plus \$111,287,111 at a funding assistance rate of normal FAR + 20% (71%) towards permanent reinstatement from Local Roads Maintenance Activity Class.
- Noted in April 2023 the Board approved initial funding of \$56.44m (NLTF share \$41.19m) up to 30 June 2023 in relation to emergency works arising from NIWE.
- Noted AT have requested additional funding for FY 2023-24 and FY 2024-25. However, Waka Kotahi in consultation with AT have agreed to seek funding only for FY 2023-24 in view of funding uncertainty in subsequent years. A further funding request for total estimated cost of \$142.47m in FY 2024-25 will be submitted once Crown funding is confirmed.
- Noted that, without further Crown appropriation, the recovery funding for FY 2023-24 would not be affordable alongside other investment requirements.
- Noted that the enhanced FAR of normal FAR +40% towards immediate response has been supplemented by Crown appropriation for emergency works relating to NIWE.
- Noted that this request is the first and most advanced request for investment to support local road recovery. Further, significant funding requests are expected in the next few months from other councils impacted by NIWE.

GWRC growth buses 24-25 NLTF funding

- Endorsed the Electric Vehicle 'Growth Buses' Continuous Programme Single Stage Business Case.
- Noted that Greater Wellington Regional Council will order 36 new buses at a cost of \$6.23m (51% FAR; \$3.18m NLTF share), with an expectation that Waka Kotahi will fund the new public transport services as part of the public transport continuous programme in 2024-27, subject to NLTP inclusion and funding availability.
- Noted that future funding for the remainder of the buses in the business case will be sought though subsequent NLTP bids.

Improved Asset Management

- Approved investment to Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency for \$1.53M at a funding assistance rate of 100% (\$1.53M from the 2021-24 NLTP) for contract establishment during 2023/24 from the Investment Management Activity Class for Consistent Condition Data Collection.
- Approved investment to Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency for \$18.86M at a funding assistance rate of 100% (\$18.86M from the 2024-27 NLTP) for management and contract delivery commencing 1 July 2024 from the Local Roads Maintenance Activity Class for Consistent Condition Data Collection.
- Noted Waka Kotahi will consider a business case supporting the continuation of the Te Ringa Maimoa partnership programme as part of the 2024-27 NLTP development.
- Noted a proposal is underway for enhanced pavement condition surveys for state highways. The \$2.6m annual funding has been included within overall data collection requirements outlined in the State Highway Activity Management Plan seeking prioritisation in the National Land Transport Programme.

Transport Services funding decisions

Supporting Growth Alliance Route Protection

- Endorsed the North Integrated Transport Network Detailed Business Case.
- Endorsed lodgement of Notices of Requirement for route protection of strategic transport infrastructure, including:
 - A dedicated rapid transit corridor between Albany and Milldale
 - Widening of the existing SH1 corridor between Albany and Silverdale, including for a new active modes path and bus lanes, and three new/upgraded motorway interchanges.
- Approved release of \$18.7m of 2021 24 NLTF funding for postlodgement activities:
 - \$9.9m to Waka Kotahi (\$4.8m from the State Highways Improvements activity class and \$5.1m from the Public Transport Infrastructure activity class)
 - \$8.8m to Auckland Transport from the Local road activity class (51% FAR; \$4.5m NLTF share)
 - Subject to the condition subsequent that Auckland Transport fund any property cost within their designations that occurs during the pre-implantation phase at 100% local share.
- Endorsed the Pukekohe Arterials Detailed Business Case.
- Endorsed lodgement of Notices of Requirement for route protection of strategic transport infrastructure, including:
 - o A new state highway corridor connecting Drury and Pukekohe

- An upgrade of the existing corridor between Pukekohe and Bombay to a new state highway.
- Approved release of \$13.1m from the 2021 24 NLTF funding for post-lodgement activities:
 - \$6.0m to Waka Kotahi from the State Highway Improvements activity class
 - \$7.1m to Auckland Transport from the Local Road Improvements activity class (51% FAR; \$3.6m NLTF share).
- Endorsed the Detailed Business Case for the South Frequent Transport Network.
- Endorsed the fifth and final site from the Detailed Business for Takaanini Level Crossings.

SH3 Waitara to Bell Block (W2BB) Scope Change

- Approved funding to Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency for the SH3/3A Waitara to Bell Block project for an increase of \$431,049 (including Admin) at a funding assistance rate of 100% (\$431,049 out of the NLTF) for Pre-Implementation from the Road to Zero activity class thereby increasing the approved total Pre-Implementation cost from \$3,804,827 to \$4,235,876.
- Approved funding to Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency for the SH3/3A Waitara to Bell Block project for an increase of \$8,289,399 (including Admin) at a funding assistance rate of 100% (\$8,289,399 out of the NLTF) for Implementation from the Road to Zero activity class thereby increasing the approved total Implementation cost from \$76,460,784 to \$84,750,183.

Approval to enter into Blenheim lease for more than 15 years

 Approved leasing the property at 76 Grove Rd, Blenheim to L&M Santarosa Ltd for a term of 16 years and 11 months plus a 10 year right of renewal \$ 9(2)(b)(ii)

Mahurangi – Penlink Project Alliance Variation Threshold

 Approved delegating authority to the Group General Manager Transport Services for the O Mahurangi Alliance variations for Waka Kotahi accepted risks and changes to contract inputs when they are negotiated, to an overall limit of \$100M, which would bring the contract value to \$610M.

Auckland Public Transport Continuous Programme 2021-24

- Noted increase of \$26.7m from the PT Infrastructure activity class due to additional maintenance costs (CRL stations and the DTFT) and under funded renewals at the time of PT continuous programme adoption in 2021;
- Noted the reduction of \$96.9m from the PT Services activity class due to availability of Crown funding for 2022/23 allowing NLTF cashflow from 2022/23 to 2023/24.
