HAVE YOUR SAY ON SAFER SPEEDS

from 23 June to 4 August 2021



We're working towards a future where no one is killed or seriously injured on New Zealand roads.

We know that speed is the single biggest factor that determines if you or someone you love dies in or survives a crash.

Lots of change is needed to get us there but there is one thing we can do that will make a huge difference immediately – ensure speed limits are safe and right for the road.

That's why we're reviewing speeds on SH73 and SH75 between Christchurch and Akaroa.

We know speed is just one part of the road safety puzzle

Along with reviewing speeds this year, we'll be undertaking nearly 30km of surfacing renewals over the next three years – approximately 30% of the corridor – plus maintenance activities such as environmental and drainage work. (Subject to funding.)

But making sure the speed limit is right for the road is still one of the best ways we can save lives on New Zealand roads.

Why we're reviewing speed limits on SH73 and SH75

This section of highway is prioritised because:

- it's high risk and we know that safer speeds save lives
- locals are already calling for speeds to be lowered in some places
- even if speed doesn't cause the crash, it's what most likely determines whether someone is killed, injured or walks away
- a small change in speed on this route will make a big difference to the outcome of a crash
- we know making changes like reducing speed will result in fewer deaths and serious injuries quickly
- anyone who's made the trip knows that it requires care, concentration and safe speeds behind the wheel
- stretches of straight road end in sharp bends and this is where fatal and serious vehicle crashes are happening
- the scenic winding sections have steep drop-offs and reduced visibility, and this is where increasing numbers of motorcyclists are being killed and injured

- cyclists and pedestrians use the road in close proximity to passing vehicles. Unforgiving roadside conditions and narrow shoulders mean there's little margin for error if simple mistakes are made
- between 2011 and 2020, 75 people were killed or suffered serious injuries in crashes on this road*, leaving families grieving and victims dealing with potentially life-long injuries.

Halswell Road bus lanes

Planning is underway to provide bus lanes along SH75 Halswell Road between Dunbars and Curletts Roads, to help improve bus reliability and travel times.

For this speed review, we are asking people to give feedback on current speeds, including on Halswell Road (see map), so any changes can be made as soon as possible.

Once bus lanes are up and running, we will revisit speeds in this area to check they are still appropriate.

Speed review process

We'll use the feedback we get during engagement to recommend what speed limits are best for these roads and then formally consult with you. The stages of the speed review are:


SPEED REVIEW STARTS	A technical assessment of the road is carried out to find out about crash history, average vehicle speeds, volume of vehicles and development of surrounding areas. This helps to determine what safe and appropriate speeds should be.
ENGAGEMENT	We talk to local communities and stakeholders to understand how the road is being used, any safety concerns and get feedback on current speeds.
FORMAL CONSULTATION	Changing a speed limit is a legal process, so this stage involves sharing a detailed proposal with people and asking for any additional information that might have an impact on the final decision.
NOTIFICATION OF SPEED LIMIT CHANGE	Feedback is considered and final decision is published on our website and the public is notified.
NEW SPEED LIMIT ON THE ROAD	New speed limit signs installed on the road.



Share your insights

Think about speed limits between Christchurch and Akaroa and in your community. Do they feel safe and right for the road, or are there areas where there have been near misses because it is hard to turn onto or off the highway?

Are there places where lower speeds could mean people can cycle or walk more safely? How about speeds outside your local school, marae or business?



The new closing date for feedback is now Wednesday 4 August at 5.00pm.

The feedback we get during engagement will be combined with the technical information we are gathering, to help recommend which speed limits are best for these roads. The next step is to formally consult with you on our recommendations later in the year.
